Using TeleHealth Technology during a Global Pandemic

Healthcare practitioners have been using technology to advance medicine for many years now - documentation, filling prescriptions, and performing innovative surgeries, to name a few. However, the use of telehealth has been more widely accepted within the last few months due to COVID-19. Some will say this has made medicine more convenient and accessible while keeping you safe at home.

Telehealth technology involves speaking to your healthcare practitioner without being in the same room. This can be done by phone calls, emails, patient portal sites

or video chats. This can be especially helpful if you have limited time, movement or transportation.

It is important to be prepared beforehand so you have a productive appointment within a limited amount of time. Write down symptoms, current or recently changed medications and any questions you may have. This will make it easier for your healthcare practitioner to get the full story without being able to physically examine you.

Although much more convenient, this does not replace all visits to healthcare providers. It is important to discuss your individual needs and accept guidance from your doctor in order to keep yourself safe and healthy.

History of the Sacred Heart Home

In 1950, the Brothers purchased 126 acres of farmland in Clarence, NY, which would eventually evolve into today's "Brothers of Mercy Wellness Campus". The Sacred Heart Home was the original Skilled Nursing building.

In 1951, ground was broken on the first wing of Sacred Heart Home, which served 36 male patients at that time.



In 1963, Sacred Heart Home added a South Wing and new Chapel to the facility. At a cost of \$1.3 million, the expansion added 56 beds (going from 36 to 92) to the facility.

In summer 2020, the new Memory Care and Enhanced Assisted Living community will add another level of care to the Clarence Wellness Campus. The new building will retain the Sacred Heart Home name, honoring all those that worked and lived in our first building.

The season of Easter invites us to experience God in numerous unsuspecting ways. Our circumstances are always woven with joy and sorrow. Walking into one room, you witness the sudden decline of someone's health as they return home to the Lord. Another room holds a resident who shares how fortunate they feel to have a roof over their heads and someone taking care of them under these extreme circumstances.

It has been challenging to minister to residents and staff as traditionally understood. Because of the pandemic, gathering together as a group was prohibited. There are certainly many religious programs offered on TV, but coming together to pray provides a sense of togetherness and safety. Live prayer services were also broadcast from the chapel in the nursing home to the resident's rooms through the use of a camera that is connected to Channel 97.

In the Sacred Heart Home, with the help of a wireless microphone and speaker, residents gathered at the threshold of their doorways in a given corridor to listen to a scripture reflection appropriate to the Easter Season. The gathering began with a hymn that reflected what the scriptures promise, "I have prepared a place for you," "I will not leave you orphans," "Love as I have loved you." Then the scripture passage from John's Gospel was proclaimed. In the reflection, I shared what was happening in these readings. Jesus is preparing the disciples for his departure. He tells them life will be different, but he will not leave them orphans. A powerful image and one we can easily relate to during these trying times: The feeling of being an orphan and the promise that a place has been prepared for us!

If I've learned anything about our residents it is that they are strong and resilient. Having a service in the hallway was purely experimental so I had no idea how the residents would respond. When I began, there were maybe two people listening. As I began to focus on the reading and playing the music, I looked up and noticed how many more residents joined from their doorway. To close the service, everyone present was invited to raise their arms to bless each other from the threshold of their doorways. A beautiful sight to behold!

It was touching to come together for these simple prayers. I am always amazed at the goodness that constantly rises to the surface during a difficult circumstance. This is exactly what Jesus invites us to in the readings. He invites us to a new experience of God's love for us and His presence within. "Love one another as I have loved you." Peace.

Salvatore, Mike Nugent, Ed Rath and Pat Casilio all joined us for a motorcade parade that visited all four campus communities, entertaining our residents and staff, while lifting their spirits. It was great time had by all and this



kicked off our campus-wide "Healthcare Heroes Week" celebration. A Cinco de Mayo meal was served on May 5th thanks to a most generous donor and campus resident. This was followed by a lovely donation from Rick 5mith at Clarence Pizza, providing pizza to all campus staff. Perry's Ice Cream donated their delicious ice cream to all our "Superheroes" to build their signature "Superhero" sundaes, while Clarence Country Doughnuts and Summit Health Care Solutions helped us surprise our Superheroes with doughnuts and coffee one morning!

Compassionate Care Yields Kind Words


We receive so many thank you notes, cards and letters that we would need many more pages to print. However here are a few samplings that collectively summarize those thoughts and kind words.
